# Dear Friends

It seems we don't have the time any more. We have lots of other things - more money, more leisure, more material possessions. But we don't have the time. A recent survey for the Children's Society revealed that we are a time-poor society. What that means is that the pace of modern life - hours

working, or travelling to work, the list of 'leisure' activities we think we need - takes away our time. We don't have enough time for the things that matter to us, like time with our families, time with our spouses. Even the peace and quiet of rural living is suffering. Just stand on Spenbrook Road in the morning between 7.30 and 8.30 and observe the 'rush hour'.

I wonder also whether we are neglecting quality time for ourselves. The Bishop of Reading recently spent a morning giving out egg timers on Liverpool Street Station. His point was that just 3 minutes prayer or contemplation would give us space to connect with what is important in our lives. Those few moments of stillness could prove to be invaluable stress-busters in our lives of business and worry. They would give us the space to focus on what is really important, and we could set the agenda for our lives.

Time is the one thing that we need to manage. It is ours to make the most of. And when we lose it, it doesn't come back. There is a paradox with time - often the busier we are, the more time we can find for the things that matter. It comes from focussing on what is really important.

Jesus has some words of encouragement here - "Don't be all upset, always concerned about what you will eat and drink. Your Father knows you need these things. Instead, be concerned with his Kingdom, and he will provide you with these things." (Luke 12.29-31)

Being concerned with God's Kingdom - loving God, and loving service of each other - will let everything else fall into place, and we may find we are time-rich instead of time-poor.



The recent heavy rains and consequent erosion of paths and roads has resulted in some spectacular deposits of gravel in some places in the Parish, notably at Sabden Fold and on the footpath past the toilets in Newchurch. This has raised the issue of responsibility: who should tidy up, put things right, clean the place up? Some residents argue that all these obligations lie with the Councils: Pendle Borough or Lancashire County; that it is the 'Authorities' job to attend to these tasks: "After all, we pay our rates, don't we?.."

But others say that it is the residents themselves who should take matters into their own hands, that if they want things to be better, they should get out and get their hands dirty and get the jobs done. Dependency or self-help—that is the question.

But the matter is not quite as straight- forward as that. In this age of litigation who should carry the responsibility should anything go wrong, if someone gets hurt while clearing a drain, cutting a hedge? Does this not make selfhelp impractical?

The other side of the argument is, of course, to do with cost; self-help is cheap, it costs only voluntarily-given time; the Council's work is not cheap; budgets are tight and why should a blocked drain in a tiny hamlet be attended to when there are much bigger problems to attend to, like social welfare, re-design of town centres or major road reconstruction?

So what should we do, in small villages like ours? Should we wait for the Councils to act,

knowing that our priority is low in the scheme of things? Or should we not take matters into our own hands, get out our brushes, our spades, our hedge-trimmers, and do it ourselves? It's much more fun than sitting impatiently on the phone trying to find out who in Preston is responsible for a single kerbstone.

And it's much better in another way. If you do a job in your village, you feel proud every time you pass it; "I did that, it looks much better, doesn't it?" If you did it with someone else, it builds a community spirit; you chat with your fellows workers, have a beer afterwards, have a bit of a laugh at someone's efforts; "That's not much of a job, is it?" But you do it together, it's a shared experience, and it gets the job done, when you want it to be done, not at the discretion of some bored clerk in an anonymous office somewhere.

Of course you have to make the work as safe as possible; no one wants fingers broken or toes chopped off; no one wants to cause traffic accidents. But it should be possible to do things for ourselves with care and consideration, and in so doing improve our environment and enhance our spirit of community. A shared job is a job half done, and better done, and more fun too. What do you think?
