Dear Friends

I wonder whether the vicarage garden might qualify as arable land. In the past few years I've had a small crop of wheat. Blue tits throw seed from the feeders, which germinate and grow in my badly weeded flower beds. That's the wonder of plants



- provided the seed gets into the soil, nature does the rest. The seed breaks down and new life begins.

Something Jesus once said picked up on this process. 'A grain of wheat remains no more than a single grain unless it is dropped into the ground and dies. If it does die, then it produces many grains.' Jesus was talking on a number of levels. His insight into rural life of the time; anticipation of his own death; and a truth deep within human life.

We often think that human life is about hanging on - to people, to things, even to life itself. Sadly for us, the last eludes us in the final moment. And we also know that holding on too tightly can take away the wonder of having. A relationship that does not let the other person be themselves will be short lived. Fear of losing an object precious to us may take away the enjoyment of it.

Shortly we will be celebrating the drama of Good Friday and Easter. It is the story of Jesus laying down his life in order to take it up again. It involves becoming a victim to hatred and violence in order to establish a kingdom of love and reconciliation. It means risking everything in order to gain everything.

The triumph of Easter morning is God's way of showing that it works. It is also a guarantee that we don't need to be bystanders, but can risk what we hang on to, to find it again in full measure. Archbishop Desmond Tutu encouraged people to risk themselves in the face of apartheid - not violently, but peacefully. His faith was vindicated in the non-violent transition to majority rule. He put his finger on the truth that enables us to risk all - 'Love is stronger that hate; light is stronger than darkness; life is stronger than death.'

A LITTLE SNIP OF LIVING HISTORY

What a great pleasure to attend the opening of the new extension at St Mary's school on 27th February. It is good to know that it is such a happy school where children can progress along their journey of learning. It also brought back memories to me of forty-six years ago.

I arrived at Newchurch as Head of school in January 1963, unaware that extensions on the North side were about to begin. Due to heavy blizzards, the school was closed for days. Building didn't start until March. Lockwoods of Nelson and Holgates of Fence were the builders and Lockwoods were so pleased with the way the children behaved towards the workmen and equipment and materials that they donated a silver cup to be presented each year to the child most helpful and polite to all throughout that year.

The work was completed in September but the opening was the following year and with what pomp and circumstance! It began with a service in church then the opening ceremony in school which was performed by the Bishop of Blackburn for whom a special platform had been constructed. Dignitaries from the Diocese and the Local Education Authority were present. Mrs Quinn, the school cook, provided a splendid buffet.

The second phase on the South side was to follow within 5 years.

Forty years later it happened again and what a contrast was the opening. Architects, builders, staff, children, parents, governors and friends were present and our Mayor cut the ribbon. The atmosphere was joyous and happy and relaxed. The presentation and children's performance were excellent and faith in education, for me, was restored. Long may it continue and may God's blessing be always with us.

Spring has finally made an appearance in the village to remind us what a beautiful place we live in and more of us are venturing outdoors. The 'Half Tour of Pendle' fell race, held on March 7th, was a great success and raised several hundred pounds for village funds. Traffic was managed by the police, with 'No Parking' cones keeping cars away from the pinch points on the roads. The car park was staffed by volunteers from the village to fit in as many cars as possible and many thanks go 5pm. to Clayton Harriers' marshals who support throughexcellent organisation and out the whole event.

From over 400 entries, 384 runners pleted the 9 mile course with the fastest taking a mere 1 hour 3 minutes! Anyone watching the event could not fail to be impressed by the runners' descent of the hill affectionately termed PILATES Thursday mornings. 'Geronimo' into Ogden Clough. It may be that, at long last, the old era of secrecy and inflexibility in Goldshaw is coming to an end. And Goldshaw will be the better for it. Today the PC must be aware and accountable and the fiefdoms of the past swept aside by democracy. And, of course, competence. Incompetence and a lack of imagination can no longer be hidden from the public gaze. It may be that last Friday saw the birth of a new sprit of openness and co-operation. I hope so. We already have plans for further social events again so watch our (new) noticeboards.

In a recent article in the Times, Matthew Parris argued that since WW2 our political leaders have been managers rather than leaders, reacting to events rather than planning strategies. There is merit in this argument although maybe the pace of events in the modern world is such that reacting is all that can be done and that any attempt at direction is doomed to be swept aside by events like 9/11 and economic crises - and snow! But the point remains: it is easier to let others set an agenda for us rather than to try set it for ourselves. This is not only true of the national leadership, but of parish councils; we might pretend that we set an agenda, but that is merely a list of things that have happened and to which we think we should respond. Rather we should, together, try to plan our future as neighbours - even if we are occasionally blown off course, it will be worthwhile and satisfying. (Note to Editor

: can I go now, please?) We're off now to swop the dusty concrete of Nelson for the wind-blown plains of the Western Desert and economic depression of UK for the depression of Qattara - and this is posed to be a holiday!

As the present financial year comes to an end the PC appear to have failed to carry out any of our big projects for the villages -notthrough lack of trying, but because we have run up against unforeseen problems with landowners and planning officers – but funds are in place to complete the plans toilet block in Newchurch early in the next year. The fingerpost in the village is now finished and bears the (accurate) height above sea level – and indicates our status above our neighbouring villages which I trust, will be confirmed by our further success this summer in winning the "Best Kept" competition.
