Dear Friends



Friday, 6.30pm is a bad time to ring me. I'm usually giving my full attention to the Now Show on Radio 4. If you don't know it, it's a satirical take on the week's news.

Last show we had Marcus Brigstocke lampooning the Bible - sending up laws like not eating rock badgers. If, like me, you'd been to a school where Bible reading and Bible lessons were part of the school worship as well as the curriculum, you'd probably think there was so much more material he could have used and his research was a bit shallow. But underneath it he was making a serious point - the Bible, and other religious scriptures, do seem to sanction violence against unbelievers. And Christians can't wish it away. It is there in the text. And there is a lot else that is objectionable in the early books of the Bible. Taking bits of it, as Marcus did, is to miss the point, though. For believers, the Bible is a story of an evolving awareness of what God is like. Like any good therapist, God begins where people are in a culture in which genocide is the norm, and brings them through historical setbacks, and a string of prophets, to a point where peace, justice and care for the needy is the new norm. For Christians, this culminates in Jesus who teaches love of enemies, and the ultimate ideal of giving your life for others.

Not many jokes in that, but it does helps us in addressing the needs of a world where foreign and domestic policy is dictated by insecurity coming out of them-and-us divisions - divisions like Christian West versus Muslim East or religious versus secularist worldviews.

Instead we need to look for what is good and positive in other people's beliefs, whether Christian, Muslim or secularist, and work together for the peace and need both at home and abroad. And even enjoy each other's lampooning, as long as it comes from a generous heart!

How valid is the idea of "Merrie England"?, A time when lusty ploughmen clad in smocks quaffed pints of ale, served by rosy-cheeked barmaids in honeysuckle-strewn pubs, before returning to golden fields where laughing children played around stoops of fresh-mown corn and shire horses chomped contentedly on juicy apples? When jesting men agilely threw sheaves onto a wood-wheeled cart before trudging home "as all the air a solemn stillness holds", past the ancient elms of England, tired but contented, to a homely repast of goldenyolked eggs and home-cured bacon? Where fair-haired children played round their feet, buxom wives bustled happily and kindly Grandma sat knitting by the log fire? Not valid; at all.

These were myths created by Victorians uneasy at the exploitation of the early industrial revolution and nostalgic for a pastoral past. The reality was different; villages were warrens of vermin-infested and damp, smoky hovels. The workers in the fields slaved from dawn to dusk for pennies and when the harvest was over were workless until summoned by capricious landlords to dig ditches or build stone walls as the sleet drove across the heath. Children were disease-ridden and stunted, with bad teeth and unwashed hair; constantly pregnant, barwives were maids slept with the landlord or were ejected; mothers-in-law were demanding and capricious. This was no golden age; but an age of exploitation and dire poverty, of homelessness, of the arrogant use of power and privilege.

Those who yeam for a return to those times are ignoring the facts, and ignoring the efits of industrialised society which duced widespread wealth and social freedom. The fact is that a village is no longer a viable economic unit; that those who wish to work and to be free from erratic family ties are drawn to our towns and, in them, achieve freedom and create personal wealth, ambitions impossible in the countryside. It

may be that those who are successful in an urban environment wish to return to the countryside- we have many of those in our parishbut that is their choice, their reward, and cannot be legislated for nor produced by a yearning for a non-existent past.


The concept of "affordable housing" is illogical and unsustainable; you cannot legislate to reverse natural trends in society. Just look at the definition: housing should be "of adequate standard, cheaper than available in the housing market". How can you do this economically? Those wishing to benefit from "affordable" housing must show that they have a business in the area, are in overcrowded accommodation, or need separate households. These are very difficult needs to demonstrate in our parish. The whole concept is in need of clarification and it may be that our new Borough Council has the courage to do so. The Spen Brook Mill site is presently included in those few sites in the Borough to which the "affordable" is applied and concept of we need to know, urgently, what constraints and permissions will be brought to its development.

The Parish Council sends its wishes for a speedy recovery to its Clerk, Carol, and welcomes John Parsons as her replacement. John will bring an active mind and his experience as a Headmaster to the role and will, we hope, bring discipline and wisdom to the Council's deliberations.
