Dear Friends

Stephen Hester admitted to a parliamentary committee last week that even his parents think that he earns too much money. His parents are no slouches, a professor and a psychologist. They are shocked at his basic salary of £1.2m rising to £10m over three years if he turns the Royal Bank of Scotland around.



I'm not really envious, but it led me to wonder what 'too much' money was. Elton John, I think, suggested that if you had more than £8m it was too much, because you just couldn't spend it. Few of us, especially vicars, get anywhere near that amount. But I don't think it is about how much money a person has, but an attitude to wealth.

We need money to provide us with basic needs, security and even comforts. The danger is that we can think we need more and more security and comforts. And then I think we reach a shady line where we slip over into avarice. We are led into the false belief that we need to clutch our wealth close to our chest. Hence the threats of some bankers to decamp to Hong Kong or New York if they are taxed on their bonuses.

When I was teaching in London, I knew someone who was an investment banker, but he changed tack and became a maths teacher. He had in his few short years in the bank made more money than he could in a career of teaching. He had actually heard Jesus' teaching: "What use is it if you earn the whole world's wealth but lose your very self?" The reason why medieval Christianity portrayed avarice as one of the deadly sins is that it really can kill your spirit.

This is a challenge for each of us. The most precious thing we have is the person we are, and we can choke it with preoccupations especially to do with material wealth.

We are coming up to the season known as Lent. Most people think of it as a time of giving up. But I think it is really a time to take stock. What do I really need? Where does my true wealth lie? How can I enrich myself in more than material ways, and more importantly, how can I enrich other people? And if realising that we do in fact need far less than we think, then so much the better.

Snow had fallen, snow on snow ...four weeks of it and counting. But good snow; cheerful, crisp snow; good for sledging, for photographs, for getting over the tops of your boots. And for snowballs: but why target individual households by dead of night? If you want to throw snowballs – and why not - why cover your faces and slink around in the darkness? Come out and show your faces and we'll pelt you back - but don't taunt people at home on their own, that's cowardly.

From these remarks you may gather that we've had mixed fortunes in Newchurch and Spen Brook; some silliness, some splendid co-operation between villagers helping each other with snow-clearing and shopping, some downright thievery when newly filled salt-bins are immediately emptied by chaps with tractors and shovels, a lot of good -natured grousing about gritting, a lot of determination to get to work and to make deliveries despite the conditions. The usual mixture, but our villagers have coped pretty well. There are some, inevitably, who just seem to want to complain and will never look on the positive side of anything and who will, in the words of W S Gilbert, "praise, in enthusiastic tones, every century but this and every country but his own" and who if you gave them a £50 note would undoubtedly turn it over, looking for the sell-by date. What do these people want – an enormous pile of salt every fifty yards throughout the countryside, complete with serfs who will spread it for a penny and doff their caps for the privilege?

Talking of crime, can there be any less explicable and totally pointless than the stealing of the grills from the church windows? These were made of light mesh and were of little value other than the protection they gave – is anyone building a chicken coop

next door to you?

At a couple of parties over Christmas the old topic of village halls cropped up - why don't we have a meeting place and so on? This prompted an interesting suggestion - could our splendid church be used for wider purposes? One would not wish its role as the place of worship within the community to be jeopardised in any way but would it not be possible to use it for a wider variety of community interests? Any thoughts?

Our Borough Councillor James Starkie is to be congratulated on persuading Pendle Council to give us a 49% larger grant than previously - an increase of just short of £1000. This has enabled the Parish Council to reduce its precept - its direct charge on our ratepayers – and saves every household in the parish some £2 a year on their council tax. Well done, James!

We have an interesting problem which arises from the newly delivered village signs lovely things of great craftsmanship by Duncan Armstrong – where should we put them? Are our villages contiguous, or are there areas between them of a sort of nomans land? Does Newchurch run all the way to Sabden Fold? What is a village, just the cluster of buildings or the whole area surrounding them? Where do you think you live?

Strange things happen; just before Christmas a Councillor's car was struck by - guess what - a Safe Lanes sign; you can't trust anything to behave these days!


