Dear Friends

My much admired friend Bill Bailey has made another magisterial pronouncement - the boom in comedy in the UK is because we are the most depressed country in Europe. Religion doesn't 'cut it anymore' so going out to have a good laugh is the answer. In one sense I think he is right. Comedy



has replaced religion as the opium of the people. (Sorry, Karl!) I confess to an addiction to stand-up comedy. In many of the shows I've seen, even when the comedy has been mediocre, I've noticed a widespread desire on the part of audiences to laugh at stuff that isn't funny. Perhaps comedy is like religion in the sense that an uncritical search for an escape in either is bad for people.

I disagree with Bill, though, that religion should provide a way of coping with unhappiness. In my experience, Christianity has never provided me with easy answers to life's problems. Instead it seems to focus hard questions - what makes a well-lived life? How should I respond to other people's suffering? What is right and wrong all about? Why can't I just pursue my own interests? I suppose at one level the Gospel provides some answers, but it seems to me the answers are not theoretical. Life is practical and we have to get out of our comfy chairs and live it. Jesus may be the Way, but I have to do the walking.

Richard Herring did a show recently called Christ on a Bike. It laid into religious belief, but there was more than a sense of irony when he compared his parents with himself. They are practising Christians and heavily involved in their local community in Somerset. Richard has no faith, and lives a self-centred life by his own admission. He clearly admires them, but he still couldn't find anything positive to say about their faith. Is he missing something - or does he think there are no laughs to be had in what he suspects to be true?

Comedy is more than an anaesthetic. It can deflate, challenge, inspire, and celebrate. The gospel in the right hands can do the same and more. We need more and better stand-ups - comedians and evangelists.

The following is an extract from the Burnley Express, written by the local historian, Roger Frost

JUST before Christmas, newspapers were full of the news that Malkin Tower, home of the Pendle Witches of 1612, had been discovered at a lonely location not far from the village of Barley. Even I was swept up by the excitement!

The event was presented as having a ring of truth about it as the scanty remains of a mummified cat were found. Four hundred years since the Witch Trial, the remains of a (black?) cat, the building in ruins: too good to be true, and it was!

Pendle Forest Heritage Group, which meets in the splendid Village Hall in Barley, arranged with Carl Sanders of United Utilities, who had made the discovery, to meet the archaeologist on site. I was fortunate enough to be present and thoroughly enjoyed the Saturday morning visit to Lower Black Moss reservoir where UU had been doing maintenance work.

We met Frank Giecco from NP Archaeology who gave us a conducted tour which lasted for two hours. What we visited was the substantial remains of a stone-built 17thC farmhouse. Only part of the ground floor survived but it revealed a lot about a farmhouse of that era - how it was built, the materials used, how the building was heated and how its residents prepared food. The latter was particularly interesting as a small kitchen range survived in what had been an inglenook fireplace and, better still, there was a double bread oven not unlike those which can be seen in operation in the Walled Garden at Towneley Hall.

As I say, the morning spent in the shadow of Lower Black Moss was a real pleasure and I would like to thank everyone involved - the Heritage Group, Carl and Frank - for arranging a most memorable event.

On behalf of the Parish Council can I wish all villagers, their families and friends a happy, healthy and prosperous new year. 2012 promises to be a very eventful year in the village calendar.

We have scheduled for late spring, although the exact date has still to be confirmed, the unveiling of the Alice statue on the straight bit of road between the centre and Crowtrees. This will form part of a serious of activities to coincide with the 400th Commemoration of the so-called Pendle Witches leaving the villages.

An artist has now been commissioned and is intending to visit groups and organisations in the villages to gain a deeper understanding of what 'Alice' may have looked like. There will be an open afternoon in the Village Centre on February 11 so that residents can meet the artist, chat to her and even have their portrait drawn! The final design won't be based on anyone in particular though so fear not! Funding is from PBC and the Forest of Bowland, who are both keen to ensure that the story of Alice in particular is properly told. The project is led by Borough Councillor James Starkie and assisted by Barley author Kate Mulholland whose book 'A cry of innocence' is all about Alice Nutter.

On Monday June 4th Roughlee will be joining Barley and Newchurch for celebrations of the Queens Jubilee.
