Dear Friends

Here's a fact for you to impress your neighbours with, or slip into a pub quiz: the word 'jubilee' comes from the Hebrew word for a ram's horn -  $y\bar{o}bh\bar{e}l$ .



The details are set in the Book of Leviticus, chapter 25, in

the Old Testament. It has all to do with the significance of the number seven.

The seventh day was to be a day of rest; the seventh year was to be a fallow year in which the land was allowed to rest, and people lived off the hopefully bumper crop in the sixth year. And then after seven periods of seven years - the fiftieth year - the trumpet - a ram's horn - was to sound throughout the land to proclaim freedom to everyone in the land. Freedom from slavery, freedom from debt, restoration of lost property and the right to an economic fresh start. It was a year for joy which is why y $\bar{o}bh\bar{e}l$  has given us another English word — 'jubilation'.

The thought behind this arrangement was that people, indeed the whole world, needed the chance to begin again. The Day of Rest gave you a chance to begin the working week refreshed. The Year of Jubilee meant that people could begin their economic life anew. (It's ironic that the government is removing the last legal restrictions on the Day of Rest in a Jubilee Year to coincide with the Olympic Games.)

Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee is a long way from the economic fresh start envisaged by the Law of Moses. It will have no impact on the bad debts of our EC partners or of people in this country. And yet the idea of renewal should not be lost. Deep debt is as bad for the lender as the borrower. People and nations need to be allowed a way back into economic activity for the good of all.

I hope that Parishioners will forgive me for taking some space for my irregular column in this month's issue but I thought there was enough going on to be able to write a piece.

One of the hardest jobs of being a Councillor is that as soon as you are elected you are thrown into a world where you have to make decisions. Real life decisions that affect real lives and, as with any decision, it's one way or the other - at the detriment of someone. Take for instance the (now shelved) idea to superimpose the numbers 1612 onto Pendle Hill. The idea was first mooted over six months ago and the tourist team had visited Barley Parish Council to seek their views. It has to be said that the views (at that meeting) were 50/50. Personally, I felt that if it helped the area, that would have been fine, but I did have concerns about how well it could have been done. In the end, the idea was scrapped but it left the subject of tourism in the mind. Several years ago when I was Chairman of Roughlee PC, I spent many an hour around the village, tidying, painting and pruning. What we had then was a pub that brought life, people and money into the village. Last week I was putting posters up for the Jubilee and noted just how quiet Roughee was. Thus the quandary of what 'tourism' actually means. If by having the odd attraction means that life flows through our lanes rather than tumbleweed, then surely that is worth having?

Whilst Roughlee has its pristine Village Centre, it is sadly underused. Our other two villages have their own challenges and pressure points. Newchurch has been a honey pot for years, with many from afar visiting the Church and the Witches Galore shop. Thus the feeling in t'Kirk is that, even without the treasured 'Lamb' there is something happening and the relatively-newly formed Events Committee has breathed more life into Goldshaw Booth, and good on 'em. Barley is thronged with a different type of tourist which helps to sustain cafés, a restaurant and a pub, as well as an excellent Hall and chapel, plus a car park which provides valuable income.

One aspect of the 'witch' story will be coming, quite soon. 'Alice' lives and is currently being constructed, cast and welded together by a young man who spent much of his youth in the village - David Palmer. Alice will be an all-metal structure and will be stood up, just below the Hartley caravan site where there is a small grassy mound. I know now that some will not like her but I ask for your tolerance. She will not resemble the traditional image and when people drive past and say "She looks nothing like a witch" that will be the legacy of the work and will go some way towards righting the wrongs of the past.

And, if sufficient people came to see her to enable the Bay Horse to re-open - so much the better!

Life in the council chamber demands that extra posts are undertaken. For the last two years I have been heading the Waste and Environmental Health portfolio. However, since the recent election when the political balance changed we now have a Conservative/LibDem 'co-operative' and my new post is Communications & PR - something which of course I do for my day job. I was also elected as Chairman of the monthly Development Management meetings where contentious planning decisions are reviewed - more decisions! Finally, I've had two or three nights out recently in the villages. One was the delightful lambing service up at Mountain Farm where we sang and gave praise for the new life on the farms. Last week I was invited to attend one of the meetings for the Jubilee. Both proved that Community does exist in Pendleside and it was marvellous to see members of all three villages working and coming together to put on events for the benefit of others. They deserve our thanks and our support. James
