Out of the mouths of babes and sucklings... In Collective worship at St Mary's School recently, we were looking at images of the cosmos, and of amazingly colourful creatures - caterpillars, butterflies, macaws. I'd asked the children to reflect silently on what they saw, and then



at the end share any feelings or thoughts they'd had. One boy put his hand up and said that it made him feel incredibly grateful to be part of it all.

Being grateful may not be our immediate response to being alive, but maybe seeing things from a child's perspective where everything is still gift, rather than the result of our striving, would do us a power of good. Because in spite of the effort we put in to getting on as adults, we do depend on receiving so much from others - cooperation, encouragement, affection. And we may just be receiving more than we deserve. From a religious perspective, all life is a gift from a gracious God.

In the collective worship we explored further what might be the implications of being grateful for being part of it all. Generosity, caring for the environment, simple joy were suggestions that came from the children.

I know we've all been moaning about the summer and the amount of rain we've had, but it shouldn't take away our sense that we belong to an amazing project which is the universe. And it shouldn't dampen our gratitude. We need a bit of perspective - can you remember it was so warm and dry in the Spring that ewes were being left out in the fields to lamb? And we need outlets for our grateful response. In October, St Mary's celebrates Harvest. It's an opportunity to celebrate in worship how much we receive and to give in return. This year we are collecting dried and tinned foods, toiletries and baby-care items. These will go to East Lancashire Women's Refuge and Colne Open Door.

Do join us in our worship on October 7th at 9.30am, and bring any gifts you want to pass on in gratitude.

Rural Watch / Farm Watch / Neighbourhood Watch

FARMERS and communities in Pendleside are invited to join a new scheme aimed at helping to prevent crime. 'Watch' allows officers to share information with householders, farmers, stable owners and any other countryside properties & businesses.

The scheme alerts suspicious behaviour or recent crimes via either email or text so that they can take the necessary precautions to keep their land and property safe.

Villagers are encouraged to inform police of sightings of suspicious vehicles, concern of stock, poachers or other unusual activity and this information will then be passed on to others involved in the scheme. This makes people more vigilant and protective of their property at key times.

Keith Sandham, Watch Liaison Officer at Burnley Police Station, who is coordinating the scheme, said: 'Watch' will help form closer working links with farmers and communities in rural areas and hopefully improve their confidence and allow us to share far more information in the future."

BARLEY

So, 1612 did appear on our side of Pendle filter beds site next to the Village Hall. The Hill [pictured left] and it formed a stunning backdrop to the gathering of 1300 people, many dressed as witches, who climbed the hill on a charity walk and raised over £30,000 for our local hospice. The "witches" enjoyed the favourable weather, the musical entertainment on the Village Green and the local hospitality with Barley again successfully hosting a major Apparently 482 witches in traditional dress (pointy hat, cape & broomstick) attended and it was enough to gain entry into the Guinness Book of Records as the largest ever gathering of witches, a record we could hold for some time providing the Guinness team did not spend the Saturday night in downtown Burnley!

The event was all about commemorating the trial of local people for witchcraft 400 years ago at Lancaster Assizes on 18-19 August 1612 and their subsequent hangings The 1612 numerals on 20th August. attracted wide attention to this anniversary and were covered by the news media and social websites, pictures were beamed around the world on e-mail and Facebook and I was amused by the pictures and commentary on the popular "Claretsmad" website as fans around the world looked on After all the fuss and shared stories. everybody I met applauded the image and the local artist, Phillippe Handford, who used fabric to set out the numbers which were of the 1612 period font copied from local gravevards.

Moving on to more good news, we have a new Parish Councillor. I am very pleased to welcome and announce that Sue Statham has been co-opted and I am looking forward to the energy and vigour she puts in to the village being harnessed by the Council.

Many of you have probably seen the mobile eatery that has recently be stationed at the enterance to Boothman Wood. Suprisingly the PC was not made aware of this development and we are not sure arrangements and considerations needed before you can set up and start selling food to the public on the highway - I am sure Pendle BC will be looking into this and we will await a response to our guery. We have erected a new noticeboard by the Bullion and for those that use it you will find it much easier to get your pins in to it. Finally, thanks to Margaret, Chris, Sue, Caroline, Ian and Sally-Anne who removed hundreds of Himalayan Balsam around the car park and river bank trying to stop the spreading of this pervasive plant up towards

our reservoirs.

We were rather optimistic regarding completion of the work on the Village Hall and there were some delays as our contractors had to finish some work on a school before the start of a new term. However we are looking towards an early completion now, depending on suitable weather to complete final painting of new window frames & doors. Despite the delays our contractors have done an excellent job but it will be nice to see the Hall without any "work in progress" which has continued from the start of the flood refurbishment in February. We are seeing an increase in bookings and our promotion of the Hall will now begin locally and to the wider public throughout the area. Goldshaw Booth

There hasn't been much" mellow fruitfulness" about the autumn so far, more of the "winter storms begin", and the swallows have gone back to an ex-pat life in Tenerife. They probably do this to avoid UK taxes, in common with so many of our fellow citizens who come to the UK for all the good things - like summer – and then beggar off back to the sunshine. What a splendid idea, although we can't grumble, having spent the last three weeks enjoying the National Parks of the USA.

So it's back to the Parish. We don't have a "Casual Vacancy" at the moment but anticipate a great increase in attention to our activities when the book comes out. Our problems are the usual simple things, like parking in Newchurch, and the total inability of Spen Brook to agree to the creation of a flower bed on Spen Brook Road which we have a grant to do but no consensus on what to do with it.

There are a few planning applications in at the moment which will be challenges to those who have to decide on them: the erection of an unnecessarily large agricultural store and the conversion of a derelict barn to further agricultural use. Obviously farming is flourishing if these two expensive projects can be undertaken but this may not be the whole story. Wait and see.

And the other application is also contentious: the development of Spen Brook mill and the application for some 30 houses and commercial use in the converted mill which will be heard at Barrowford and Western, probably in November. This ranks as a "major development" which is prohibited under the rules of the AONB but could be permitted under "exceptional circumstances" as the only brown-field site in Bowland. The PC has made its initial submission to Planning Officers, following the public meeting on 28th August, and Councillors have had further discussions to try to balance the agreed need for tidying the site with the fear of a development which overwhelms the hamlet. We intend to keep parishioners informed on this difficult matter and hope that a good representation from the area will take the opportunity to speak at the November meeting. As in all these subjects, the difficulty is in isolating financial and infrastructural matters from the planning considerations on which the decision will be made.

We have received notification of the imposition of a part-time 20mph limit on Spen Brook road; personally I would like to see it extended right through the villages – and adhered to. We have too many speeders!

ROUGHLEE

Another quiet month in the village, with nothing much to report, but with local planning applications starting to dominate our agenda. By now you should have read that we did not win any awards in the BKV competition, but that we did still come a creditable 5th in our category, so well done and thanks to all who make and keep our village tidy.

Music festivals have been and gone, having brought the rain gods with them (and left them), and apart from some minor noise nuisance appear to have passed without incident. With regards to planning applications that affect our village, for those of you that are interested they can be viewed on our website - www.roughlee.org.uk

On a more mundane note we appear to have several instances of Ragwort growing in the village in gardens, public area and the pub car park, please can I ask that if you have some of this growing in your garden you do your best to remove it.
