Dear Friends

What price a hair-cut?

I was looking at a charity flier from Crisis at Christmas. £20.48p gives a homeless person a place on their Christmas scheme. Among the list of things provided for that money were the obvious, like food and shelter, and the desirable, like free medical,

dental and podiatry treatments. And there at the bottom of the list was a haircut. What a wonderful gesture — something as frivolous and unnecessary as tending a homeless person's coiffure!

Compassion can sometimes become patronising. We can be drawn into simply treating the problems of people in need. It is important to remember the uniqueness of the person on the receiving end of charity and their entitlement to dignity. A hair-cut seems to me to be a symbol of exactly that. A simple act which restores and refreshes their appearance.

When Mary, the mother of Jesus, became pregnant she visited a relative. During the visit she was filled with the Spirit and burst into song - a song that has passed into Christian worship as The Magnificat. It is a song which reminds us that God has a particular heart for the people at the bottom of society's heap. It is reminds us how far we fall from God's will when we devote our energies to maintain our position on the heap to the detriment of others.

A wonderfully Pickwickian carol which unfortunately isn't in St Mary's hymnbook has a refrain, 'O tidings of comfort and joy'. It seems to me that if the Christmas story is about comfort and joy, then we need to ask what we are doing about it. Can we spread our comfort and joy into the lives of other people? It might cost us, but we would be doing something for other people's dignity.

May I wish you comfort and joy this Christmas, and throughout 2013!

PENDLESIDE DIAMOND JUBILEE COMMITTEE

The accounts of the Committee have now been finalised and show a surplus of £2400. As agreed earlier, this has been divided in equal proportions between the three villages.

Roughlee Village Centre and Roughlee Booth Parish Council shared £600. Barley Methodist Chapel, including the Barley FOG club, the Table Tennis group, and the Sunday School, shared £600 with the Barley Village Hall Keep Fit class, the Badminton group, the Pendle Forest History Group, and Pendle Patchers.

St. Marys Church and St Marys C of E School in Newchurch received £300 each.

The Committee once again thanks all those who gave so much time and effort to this most successful venture. The account will now be closed.



At the time of writing we are in our first cold snap of the winter and we are scraping ice from our cars and wondering if there is worse to come. The good news is that accesses to our village remains on the County Council Winter Maintenance priority treatment network and so we expect to see a Gritter on our roads when it is freezing or snowing. The Gritter travels from Whalley Depot on a 60 mile route travelling through Read, goes along the Padiham By Pass to Barrowford, over to Gisburn, along to Rimington and Downham, up to Annel Cross then down to Barley and weaves around our local roads. Whilst this is a comfort to us I would emphasise that the weather is unpredictable, it could freeze before the Gritter arrives and we suffer from water crossing the roadway from fields and washing the salt off - then freezing. Advice is to drive very carefully even if vou have seen a Gritter because there could be ice just around the corner.

Planning Update – the application to build a large barn alongside the bridleway between Barley and Whitehough has been rejected for a second time because of the visual impact it would have on a public area in the AoNB. The HM Inspector visited the Barley Green Filter Beds site in November and we await a decision on whether permission will be granted to build three houses or not.

A licence was granted for the Catering Van to trade for 28 days per year on the roadside below Boothman Wood and I understand the applicant was also awarded a licence to trade in Nelson.

At Boothman Wood, enforcement action regarding the removal of the camping pods is expected in January 2013.

United Utilities are charged with "upgrading" the spring water supply to properties around Lower Black Moss

reservoir by connecting their domestic water supply to the mains network starting in early December and finishing in February 2013. This is to ensure the domestic supply meets modern standards. The connection will be made at the Village Hall and it is then hoped to thread the new supply pipe up existing redundant pipes in the roadway so minimising any digging in the road. The pipe will then branch off and cross fields to four properties. The Parish Council has agreed to lease 1/3 of the car park (lower end by recycling area) to the contractor carrying out the works and this should minimise any disruption to residents.

The Annual Remembrance Service was again well attended, with a wreath laid in memory of local people who gave everything. I would like to thank Cllr John Connor for making all the arrangements again and the support from the Village Hall.

I will finish by wishing Happy Birthday to John Lowcock who leaves his sexagenarian years behind and on behalf of the Parish Council I would like to wish everybody in the Parish a Happy Christmas. Derek Heap

ST. MARY'S PRIMARY SCHOOL

We are very pleased to announce that our school has been awarded with our second Green Flag after the Eco Council gave a super presentation to the Assessor. We were highly praised and a fitting comment was made in our visitors' book.

We are very proud to have also received our second Race Equality Award. Jane Richmond, Teacher Advisor for Cohesion, wrote this in our visitors' book: 'l came back into this school to re-assess them for renewal of the Lancashire Race Equality Mark. The Learning Environment is outstanding and is positive example such а of excellent practice in Race Equality.' Once again we had a visit from the Lancashire Life Education Bus. The aim of the highly trained educators is to work with children between the ages of 4 and 11 to equip them with the life skills they need to help them make healthy choices. Age related sessions throughout the day were designed to increase a child's sense of personal self-worth and encourage positive attitudes towards themselves and their health.

Following half term 20 of our children started an after school Street Dance course run by the Sportscool Group. This will run for 5 sessions.

On Thursday 15th November our school was used as a Polling Station for the Police and Crime Commissioner Election. During the day we had a whole school trip to

had expected We the outline application for the development of Spen Brook Mill to be scheduled for the meeting of B&WP in December; but it has been delayed until lanuary. We hope that all those interested will have looked at the PBC Planning website and will find there some explanation of how the application progressed; has throughout the process the Parish Council has been involved with the developer and his agents, and with Planning Officers. The PC now has to agree on what our argument should be when we address the six Borough Councillors who constitute the B&WP committee. Our survey in September showed that all who responded wished the site to be developed; it also showed that fewer houses than the 30 which are proposed would be the local choice. Unfortunately, the number of units is not something we can influence: an applicant can apply for whatever he wishes. The logic is therefore

that if 30 is too many, we should request declinature; this might leave the mill undeveloped; this is contrary to the wish for progress indicated by our survey. A bit of a quandary.

We hope that we will be able to hold another public meeting before the hearing to attempt to resolve this difficulty; in the meantime, please look at the website. What happens at Spen Brook will change the hamlet, but will also have an effect on the whole of Pendleside.

If you are interested in the speed and capacity of the broadband service in the parish, please come to our next meeting when the MD of Boundless Communications, Mr D Burnes, will be giving a talk on how the service can be improved.

Parking in Newchurch is difficult for us all; we can only hope that everybody shows consideration for others – and this includes through traffic which sometimes speeds through far too quickly. There is little the PC can do to alleviate the problem although we are very much aware of the problems and take every opportunity we can of bringing the matter to the attention of the Lancashire County Council and other bodies.

All your Parish Councillors wish you good cheer and happiness over Christmas and prosperity and good health in 2013.
