Unable to resist the hype I went to see Tom Hooper's film Les Misérables. Massive, rather than intimate as in a theatre, it is still well worth seeing. Once you get used to Russell Crowe singing, and the variety of camera angles, it is an impressive piece of cinema.



It also made me re-engage with the story and especially the contrast between the two main characters, Valjean, a reformed criminal, and Javert, an unrelenting minister of the law. There are a few sermons in that somewhere. Questions of goodness and justice underlie the story, and although it is set in post-revolutionary France in the first half of the nineteenth century, these questions are topical two hundred years later. How do we respond to people in need?

The plight of poor people in northern cities has been in the news recently. The Greater Manchester Poverty Commission has revealed 600,000 people in deep poverty in the area, and a total of 1.6 million people of danger of sliding into deeper poverty. A conference in Liverpool last week of faith leaders and council leaders from northern cities heard how council budgets had to make cuts of £250 per head compared with just $\pounds 2$ per head in rural authorities in the south. Questions are raised of justice and concern for the plight of poor people, and how do we respond. The Bishop of Liverpool thought it went beyond justice. He said, "We do best as a society when we provide for others out of our sense of humanity what we provide for our families out of a sense of affection."

Javert and Valjean are archetypal responses. And perhaps justice takes us only so far. In spite of the high emotion of the finale, I was still struck by the words, "To love another person is to see the face of God."

BARLEY

We are now well into 2013 but I must mains network is underway. start by wishing all our parishioners a healthy and prosperous 2013, or at least the last eleven months of it. Looking ahead there will be a few challenges for the PC. The decision of HM Planning Inspector was to grant permission to United Utilities to build three houses on the Barley Green filter beds site. This has come as a major disappointment to the residents of Barley Green, the Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council.

We had hoped that the objections raised by thirty villagers and the refusal of planning permission by Pendle Borough Council might be enough but the man from Bristol had other ideas – so much for the government's support for local choice and democracy. An agent is now advertising the site for sale with a guide price of £210,000 - that sounds a lot of money for the site to me!

If planning permission had not been granted we could probably have acquired the site at an affordable price and it would have been a tremendous asset to the Village Hall. The Village Hall Committee and the PC are now looking at options to raise finance to make a bid for the site but it will require a lot of effort, a lot of fortune and some willing benefactors to make it happen.

application has blighted This our intentions for 2013 as we have held on to our money in the hope that we might be able to acquire the site and this will continue for a couple of months whilst we consider options, or if the site is sold. If we are not successful then we will have to get back to spending our monies on other parts of the village.

The decision on the introduction of camping pods into Boothman Wood is now with the HM Inspector from Bristol and we are awaiting a decision.

Work to introduce a domestic water supply to properties around Lower Black Moss reservoir by connecting them to the

The connection will be made at the Village Hall and it is then hoped to thread the new supply pipe up existing redundant pipes in the roadway so minimising any digging in the road. The PC has agreed to lease over 1/3 of the car park to the contractor carrying out the works and this should minimise any disruption to residents.

Your Councillors in 2013 are John Connor, David Goodger, Derek Oldham, Frank Rigg, Susan Statham, Frank Wilkinson and myself. Our Clerk is Vicky Thorp and Caroline Heap is our Finance Officer.

Our role is to look after the character and maintain the fabric of the village and represent you on a range of matters including planning, so if you think we should know something tell us, if we can help, ask us and when we need you, please support us.

Thank you to all who supported the PC at the hearing of the Spen Brook Mill application on 10th January and particularly to those who spoke so eloquently. Although the refusal was ultimately based on two definitions "exceptional circumstances" and "public interest", the strongly held and powerful arguments expressed by the community were significant in persuading the committee towards refusal. We do not know what the intentions of the developer will now be. If he appeals to the Planning Inspectorate in Bristol the matter passes out of our hands and we will lose our ability to influence it to some extent. The PC, and the public, will be able to register with the Inspectorate to give their views and this may result in a public hearing. Once again the PC will monitor the procedure and keep the parish informed.

And now to my current bête noire: cats. I like cats. But I don't like these pampered, well-fed, needle-clawed predators attacking my birds. Particularly when the snows lie deep and crisp, etc, and there are few insects and worms around to feed them. At these times these ferocious creatures should be kept in, snuggled up around the fire. Keep them well fed- and keep them in!

Another of my current vexations is democracy. It never worked, even in 4th century Athens, when some 10,000 citizens ran the place for their own benefit and over 70,000, women, foreigners and slaves, were totally disenfranchised. And it doesn't work now. Too many vocal minorities get too much attention; the upset and delay which they cause is in inverse proportion to their numbers. And the BBC finds them and gives them air-time. Sometimes I think that the BBC is on a crusade of disruption and its constant ploy of promoting minority views through some indignant and personal dissatisfaction is, frankly, immoral. Take Europe. Everyone knows we should be in Europe; everyone grumbles about it. It's like the weather, there to be complained about. But to come out? That would be unutterably stupid. So why does the BBC want us out and why, oh, why, does this Government not have the guts to tell the sceptics they're wrong and out-of-date. I suppose that's democracy ? Trouble is: democracy may be the worst of all systems – until you look at the alternatives.

The Village Centre Committee runs several events over the year to raise funds to cover items like heating, lights, insurance - which as you would expect all come at considerable expense.
