Dear Friends

Just when we were looking forward to spring, and the first lambs were appearing in our fields, an arctic blast flung us back into winter. Roads into the villages were blocked by drifts, and even 4x4s were getting stuck in the snow.



In the middle of all the chaos, I had a vision of triumph. Maybe that's a bit dramatic, but I was visiting an elderly lady bringing her Holy Communion. In the flower bed there were some narcissi in full flower poking through the snow. The sunshine caught the colour and made it radiant. It was a reminder of the power of the natural world. In the darkest winter, there is still life, and it can survive even in hostile conditions.

In one of the hymns we sing at Easter, there is a connection to our spiritual lives.

When our hearts are wintry, grieving, or in pain,

thy touch can call us back to life again.

The message is twofold: like the natural world we undergo experiences that can leave us feeling dead inside; but these experiences don't have to have the last word. Just as at this time of year we are touched by the beauty of spring flowers, and look for the greening of the fields, so we can experience new life in our hearts.


This weekend we celebrate a powerful drama of darkness and light, life and death. Sent to bring people back to relationship with a generous and loving God, Jesus fell victim to the 'arctic blasts' of people's hearts. It could have ended there, but the purpose of God is life-giving. First the women, then the men disciples encountered a living, powerful Jesus which brought them into a new life.

Why did God choose to do it this way? Christians have scratched their heads over this one through the centuries. In an enigmatic image from the world of nature, Jesus gave this answer, 'A grain of wheat remains just a grain until it is planted in the soil and dies. Only then it can produce a harvest. And so if we hang on to our lives we will be lifeless. But if we risk our lives, then we will have life in its fulness.' (John 12.24)

The winter certainly had a sting in the include changing the street lighting tail, there was not a lot of snow falling columns and lanterns to be more last weekend but the wind made all the difference and main roads over the high ground became blocked to regular traffic. We had roads that were mainly accessible but for a short stretch where you needed a front loading bucket to dig your way through drifts which I measured forward. at 6ft between Barley & Downham. What was particularly sad was a young man freezing to death in the Briercliffe area, we read about such events in the Alps and the Cairngorms but last weekend a devastating tragedy for a family happened right here because the forces of nature were under-estimated.

The Planning Inspectors envoy from Bristol visited Boothman Wood in early March and he has supported the view of PBC and the Parish Council that the Camping Pods that have been erected without planning permission are not appropriate in the AONB and SO enforcement action will be taken to ensure they are removed.

There are numerous reasons why the PC and residents objected to the proposed camp site and I am particularly pleased for the residents of Whitehough and Narrowgates that the likely intrusion will not be inflicted on them.

There is some good news on the Barley Green filter beds development, you will be aware that a different envoy from Bristol approved the building of three houses on this site, which was sold by UU. A new planning application has been submitted to build one dwelling, no details yet but this sounds encouraging as it could resolve many of the issues of concern raised by residents, including the over-development of Barley Green and increased traffic movements. More details awaited.

The PC is currently debating how to invest our funds to improve the fabric of the village. Projects being considered

sympathetic with the village setting, pothole repairs, improving landscaping round the car park area and footpath repairs. The Annual Parish Meeting is scheduled for 8th May and you are invited to come along and put your views Derek Heap
