

Interesting developments about Spen Brook Mill: notification of appeal against the refusal has been posted. Please see the PBC Planning website under 13/12/0346P which gives the grounds cited for appeal and a direction to the Planning Inspectorate website. Any comment to the Pl should be sent in triplicate and should quote APP/E2340/A/13/2199070; your PC will be making a submission on the lines of its earlier objections.

We have had discussions with the developer and PBC about an alternative proposal and hope to be able to make details public within a few weeks. The alternative currently being considered is, in my personal opinion, much more attractive, and incorporates many of the changes which we suggested when considering the earlier scheme. I believe that the mill is an eyesore and is a greater blot on the landscape than a sympathetic housing plan without a commercial element and for fewer buildings. The PC will call a public meeting when the plan is finalised.

The village party on the 24th was poorly attended but very much enjoyed by those who were attracted by Debbie Mousley's nibbles and plenty of wine; we shall have to consider the timing more carefully for next year as its coincidence with the Bank Holiday may have contributed to the sparse attendance. The PC is grateful, once again, to Debbie and Lee and also to the Events Committee for their financial support.

National financial support for the Borough Council is again being reduced and there will be renewed pressure on them to devolve responsibilities to local hands. I fear that the public toilets in Newchurch may be threatened and we will have to consider whether we, from our funds alone, can continue to provide these facilities to our visitors.

The two hamlets look smart at the moment after the efforts of a few dedicated people whom we should all thank and our hopes for success in the Best Kept Village competition are high: please keep up the good work! The roads are much improved following the re-surfacing and make the place much neater; the work on re-lining the parking bays will be done soon with some small alterations. Would the owner of the small black cat with the red collar please restrain it from decimating our bird and vole populations – it can't be that hungry!

Pendle BC dominates PC affairs just now. All PC's have been summoned to a meeting with the Borough Council to be informed of the impact of the Governments spending cuts and how it will affect us, you can guess what is coming. PBC have also approved the planning application for a 30% increase the size of one of the three dwellings being constructed next to the Village Hall, somewhat bizarre as PBC turned down the original application for three dwellings on the grounds of the impact on the area and on the Barley Green grade listed buildings. I could not understand the logic to the wav Councillors voted and the obvious contradiction in this decision.

The car park toilets have become a bone of contention. They smell and that means they are not cleaned properly and cleaning is arranged by PBC. The advice from PBC is that we should get our marigolds on and do the business. We also hear that after the spending cuts "spending a penny" could become a thing of the past in Barley and our visitors will have to hang on till they get home. The Privy Council discussed this issue at some length but no motion was passed on the night, we will see how things pan out.

The best kept village competition is underway so thanks to everyone who does their bit and especially to Mr & Mrs Corcoran who have adopted the raised garden as you leave the village towards Downham and are keeping it well maintained.


