Dear Friends

34 sleeps to Christmas and counting. Well, some children and Asda are. The rest of us are probably just amazed at how quickly Christmas comes round.



My thoughts are turning towards the church celebrations.

Reflecting on the Christmas story I find a conundrum. We celebrate the birth of the Saviour, the Prince of Peace, some two thousand years ago. But when we look at the news all around us, the world still needs saving and the Prince of Peace seems to have been elbowed out by non-stop conflict. So what are we actually celebrating?

One word keeps coming back to me – compassion. We know what that word means. And most of us know what it feels like. Compassion for me is the key to Christmas. It is not simply feeling sorry for someone else. At root it means actually being alongside someone and knowing what they feel like. But even then there is a barrier because how do we really know. People talk about walking a mile in someone else' shoes. But what if we could get inside someone's life. Then we would really know.

Christians use the word 'Incarnation' to describe how God did this. God does not stay on the outside of the universe. Some Christian physicists think he is on the inside through the laws of physics. Incarnation means that in the life of one individual, God gets an inside take of what it is to be human. It is not just curiosity though. It is about transformation. Jesus actually changes what it means to be human. He sets a pattern in how to live compassionately. He makes change a real option — in giving we really receive; in putting ourselves last, we are really first; and in dying, we are really alive.

How many therapists does it take to change a light bulb? One, but the light bulb has to want to change. It's the same with us. If we don't want to be saved, God won't force us. If we are stuck in our anger and resentment, the Prince of Peace won't stop us fighting. If we want it, then God will change us and the benefit will be felt all around. I believe God will eventually persuade all of us that change does make sense.

So, have a peaceful and happy Christmas and unending blessings in the New Year.

Barley Parish Council We will soon be in our first cold snap of the winter; we are scraping ice from our cars and wondering if there is worse to come. The good news is that accesses to our villages remain on the County Council's Winter Maintenance priority treatment network and so we expect to see a Gritter on our roads when it is freezing or snowing. We discussed the treatment of roads with salt at our last PC meeting and we were informed that run-off water from fields can remove the salt. Salt needs vehicle movements to make it active and it is generally ineffective below -8°c and that only 35% of the road network is actually treated - this should be enough to tell you that we should be extra careful driving in cold rural areas. On top of this, isolated showers cause havoc from time to time by washing off the salt, then forming ice before the roads can be treated again - we had these conditions just 2 weeks ago.

The Annual Remembrance Service was again well attended with wreaths laid in memory of local people who gave everything. I would like to thank Cllr. John Connor for making all the arrangements again and the support from the Village Hall.

The rumour in the village is that the Barley Mow has been bought by a group intending to develop it as a licensed premise. If so a planning application will follow and we will keep you informed about the developers plans. On behalf of the Parish Council I would like to wish everybody in the Parish a Happy Christmas and a healthy and prosperous 2014.

It is very important that we keep the building warm to prevent certain wooden stops in the organ mechanism from swelling and sticking.

is available in St. Mary's Church for those who wish to hang stars in memory of anyone they wish. It will remain in church until Epiphany

when the stars will be taken down and used in prayer during the service.

Goldshaw Booth Parish Council The first application for permission to develop Spen Brook Mill - for commercial use of the mill and 30 houses - has been turned down after appeal. A speedy judgement following the Inspector's visit on 11th November was critical of the proposed design and layout. He put a strong emphasis on the site's situation within an AONB and in the Newchurch and Spen Brook Conservation Area. He classes the proposals as a "major" development and argues that, as would be required under AONB rules, this is not "in the public interest". There is, to my mind, a slight uncertainty arising from the use in his ruling of the qualifying phrase "given the layout of the 30 dwellings". This might be interpreted to imply that an alternative layout and number could be acceptable. This is interesting in the context of the new proposals for the site under 13/13/0531P now being considered by PBC. A public meeting to discuss these new plans was held at St Mary's Church at 7.30pm on 26th November. It wouldn't be unfair to say that more people are now in favour of development but that there are still mixed views.

There is no news yet about the future of the Newchurch toilets; the PC have received a number of letters, from the Church, local businesses, and from walking groups, arguing against closure which will be put before PBC when discussions start. The PC have, in the interim, started to think about the site, should there be closure; we do not want the block locked up and abandoned. It could be demolished, with the garden extended or made into a car park: any other ideas would be very welcome.

During the next year or so work will be done in thinning out the Sparable woods to encourage the growth of the surviving trees. This will have to be done by local labour after the trees have been marked although PBC may be able to help with work experience labour and we could use the Community Service which has done a great job in the churchyard and the playing field. There could be lots of logs available!

Our parish councillors send their very best wishes to all our constituents, trusting that you will have a happy Christmas and a healthy and successful 2014.
