Dear Friends

First of all, may I thank you for your generous response to the St Mary's appeal for recent restoration work. So far we have received £5550, with more money pledged. That amount should also be increased by HMRC through gift aid. If you were hoping to give and hadn't got round to it, the appeal isn't closed yet. But we are delighted with what have received.

appeal isn't closed yet. But we are delighted with what have received. Time moves on. Already we are into February. The winter hasn't hit us yet, but constantly looking for signs of spring. But winter has its blessings

too. Sitting by a fire in the evening reading is one of mine – glass of whisky optional.

I'm just finishing a biography of George Herbert, a 17th century poet. He had an unsettled spirit — his high ambitions did not satisfy him once he had achieved them. He had a brilliant career as Orator of Cambridge University, and walked away from it.

Even as a poet, Herbert wasn't very dynamic. In his lifetime he published only Greek and Latin verse. As he neared death, Herbert decided to entrust his English poems to Nicholas Ferrar with the instruction that he could publish them if he thought people would find them useful.

Ferrar hadn't, we would have missed out on some of the most beautiful poetry of that time.

Herbert decided on a career in the Church of England. In those days, it was who you knew, and he landed a tidy job at Leighton Bromswold, but he didn't bother to live there. Instead he spent his last few years as vicar of two little churches near Salisbury. And there he found peace, living among ordinary folk, leading a simples but generous life, and coming up with the first ever manual on rural ministry. One of his maxims was, Speak in terms people understand and use things like agriculture and livestock to get the Gospel over. He died just short of his fortieth birthday on March 1st 1633. As a life it was not much to shout about. And yet he found tremendous peace and satisfaction in simplicity. And his relationship with God was something he explored in poems that still resonate.

"Love bade me welcome: yet my soul drew back, Guiltie of dust and sinne.

But quick-ey'd Love, observing me grow slack
From my first entrance in,

Drew nearer to me, sweetly questioning,

If I lack'd any thing.

A guest, I answer'd, worthy to be here:

Love said, You shall be he.

I the unkinde, ungratefull? Ah my deare,

I cannot look on thee.

Love took my hand, and smiling did reply,

Who made the eyes but I?

Truth Lord, but I have marr'd them: let my shame

Go where it doth deserve.

And know you not, sayes Love, who bore the blame?

My deare, then I will serve.

You must sit down, sayes Love, and taste my meat:

So I did sit and eat."

Goldshaw Booth Parish Council

With the recent resignation of two members of the Parish Council, there are now two vacancies for co-opted members. Details are on the village notice boards, if you are interested please come along to the next Parish Council meeting at 7pm Tuesday 11th February at St Mary's schoolroom.

Planning – At Barrowford and Western Parishes meeting on January 9th with regards to the Spenbrook Mill Development plans to create ten three bedroom residential units in the former mill building, plus eighteen four and five bedroom detached houses to the west of the mill building, demolish the modern industrial buildings and landscape the area. Six local residents spoke very eloquently to oppose the proposed plan as this will almost double the size of Spenbrook. Pendle Borough Councillors requested the decision be deferred until the next meeting, as since the last report amendments had been made to a number of conditions. Councillors asked for more time to study these before making a decision.

Toilet Block - Mr P Mousdale, Executive Director of Borough of Pendle attended our last meeting, with regards to the costs of maintaining the toilets. After a discussion it was agreed this will be an agenda item at the next meeting. Kathleen Wilkin-

Hillendale Vehicle Challenge

In the Autumn term the junior children entered a competition run by Hillendale to design and build a vehicle using waste materials. The children worked in teams of four, starting with drawings and sketches and produced five vehicles which were taken to Hillendale to be tested and evaluated.

Zeeshan, age 9 reported "We took part in a vehicle challenge. Our team had to do planning and research to decide how best to build the vehicle, who to sell it to and for how much. We used recycled materials to make our vehicle which we called Minotaur. When it was painted and dry we tested it on a ramp. I've learnt that a car has to be light and aerodynamic."

In November we learnt that one of our entries, Doom Skull, which was produced by Henry M, Bill, Henry R and Jonah, had won! Claire from Flash Bang Science and Tracey from Hillendale came to school to present prizes to the children and in February the whole school will spend a day with Claire working in the mobile Flash Bang Science lab as part of our prize.

Barley Parish Council The major topic of conversation in the Village since Christmas has been the submission of a planning application for the redevelopment of the Barley Mow.

We called a public meeting which was held on Wednesday 22 January. Two representatives from the Seafood Pub Company - the new owners of the building - attended the meeting and presented their plans for the property. Their proposal is for a pub with five bedrooms, to construct a new toilet area, to move the entrance door and create a covered veranda to the rear for outside dining.

A large number of residents attended the meeting to express their views, with concerns over parking in an already busy area of the village being the most common. In response, the company stated that the staff working at the new Barley Mow will be brought in from its sister pub, the Assheton Arms in Downham and, that a subsidised taxi service for diners will be introduced.

Should the planning application be approved, concerns over parking may or may not be realised but we trust the company will be as good as their word and work together with residents to resolve them.

Residents of Beckside raised specific issues relating to noise and kitchen ventilation: thev have entered into dialogue with the company and these potential problems will hopefully be resolved.

The Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting on Wednesday 29 January and will express villagers' concerns over parking and noise to Pendle Borough Council Planning Department. Residents were also encouraged to submit their own comments direct to the planners should they wish to. The application will in all probability be heard in public at a future meeting of the Barrowford & Western Parishes Committee. Vicky Thorp
