Dear Friends

One hundred years ago on Christmas Eve, lighted Christmas trees appeared on trench parapets on the Western Front. It was the beginning of the Christmas Truce.

What is interesting is that it wasn't a truce at all. There were no

commands to cease hostilities. It was sporadic – for some sectors it was business as normal. How the opposing troops celebrated the truce varied. Some met in No Man's Land and shared a cigarette and showed photos of loved ones; some visited each other's trenches; some exchanged gifts; some engaged in a kickabout with a football; some viewed the whole thing with suspicion – after all hadn't the Germans butchered civilians in Belgium? In some sectors it lasted 24 hours or even days until orders came to resume hostilities.

The Christmas Truce captured people's imagination and became a legend. It represented overturning violence for people's deepest desire - peace. Symbols triggered a response which shattered the conventions of war. A Christmas tree, a carol, a shouted greeting gave ordinary soldiers the authority to disobey orders and 'fraternise' - in other words to celebrate what they had in common with brothers-in-arms rather than what forced them apart.

Christmas is a time when the powers-that-be are overturned. In addressing the problem of sin and suffering, God chose not to wade in and subjugate wayward folk. Instead 'taking the form of a servant' Jesus came among us to renew our relationships with God and people. As in the case of the soldiers on the Western Front, small and ordinary has the power to make a difference. We can overcome hostility; we can be generous and compassionate; we can reconnect with the ideals that inspire us to goodness.

St Mary's will be celebrating Christmas as usual. One new feature is to have Coffee & Carols on the Sunday after Christmas at a later time, 10.30am – worship and a lie-in! Do come along, and when we sing Silent Night we'll feel solidarity with those people one hundred years ago.

Barley Parish Council

Car parking and mobile phone networks are the issues of the day this month. As I have reported previously, the PC has tolerated the contractors' vehicles working on the Barley Mow parking on the bus turning circle, within those vehicles are expensive tools and they need those tools to hand and stored securely where they can see them. The presence of these vehicles has caused the Garage, residents and visitors to use the turning circle as a parking area and so an array of vehicles have been parked there for the last few months.

The contractors will soon be gone and with the opening of the Barley Mow we now have visitors treating the circle as a car park. This has only marginally been alleviated by the opening of the Barley Mow car park. At times we now have significant congestion in the village, safety hazards caused by inconsiderate parking by visitors and our village centre piece devalued to being a car park.

Clearly things should settle down after the Christmas period as the new attraction "has been visited" but I am not expecting to have our turning circle restored to its former glory and function without some action. All our Councillors want, and have been lobbied by numerous residents who also want, the circle restoring and so that is our challenge.

To this end the PC have invited our Borough Councillor and officers of PBC to support us and I am hoping to meet with them soon to discuss what initiatives we could take forward together. I understand the circle to be owned by PBC.

The PC hosted a meeting to inform residents of a £150m government funded project to deliver mobile phone coverage to areas where the big suppliers would not provide a service under normal market conditions. The project involves constructing a 20m high lattice mast up near Aitken Wood which might or might not replace the two smaller masts up there. 3G is likely to be available and the coverage would include most residents but not all. Barley would likely qualify for inclusion in the project because we have quite a high density of properties that cannot access the mobile network. The company leading on the project are liaising with the PBC about the planning issues and the public meeting was arranged to gauge public support or objection to the proposal. Their position was that if there was positive encouragement they would proceed and if not they would go elsewhere. Subject to any future government initiatives, this might be the villages best and maybe only opportunity to get connected.

The issues discussed by the thirty residents who attended focused on the advantages of being connected, the extent of the coverage and objections to such a significant mast on our skyline in the AONB. The majority of those attending favoured the project progressing.

Rose Turner, who is writing a history of the village based upon the minutes of the Parish Council meetings between 1994 and the present, has gained access to recording equipment and will be inviting residents to contribute their recollections of the village over the last 50 years.
