Dear Friends



There has been a lot about wealth in the news recently. According to a study by anti-poverty charity Oxfam, the wealthiest 1% will

soon own more than the rest of the world's population. And leaked documents have shown that banking giant HSBC has helped thousands of its clients hide their money to evade paying hundreds of millions of pounds in tax.

Wealth is a sensitive issue. On the one hand it is good for us. Wealth creation has enabled us to enjoy a quality of life beyond the imaginings of our great-grandparents. On the other hand, too much wealth in the hands of too few people benefits nobody. Robert Peston argues that it locks up money which could otherwise be used to kick-start economies. And if the other 99% had more they would spend it, and what western economies need is high consumer spending.

The reason that wealth is so sensitive is that it raises questions of my entitlement versus the demands of other people. At that point it becomes an ethical issue as well as economic. Is my wealth primarily for my benefit? How far can I resist attempts by other people getting their hands on it, especially governments in the form of taxes? Is there a moral imperative that I should use my wealth for the common good?

The Bible gives us a perspective. Psalm 24 reminds us, The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it'. Wealth is something we hold in trust. Jesus points out that treasure is not the best security. Our most important possession is our very self - our integrity and goodness. Jesus says that you could be the richest person on the planet, but if you have lost the very thing that makes you precious in the eyes of God and of others, what's the point?

Lent is a good time for taking stock of what we value and why. To reflect on our own attitudes to our wealth might be a useful exercise.

DAVID WEATHERILL

St Mary's Church was packed to the balcony rafters as friends and family gathered to celebrate the life of David Weatherill and to pay our respects to a man well known in our community. David was badly injured in a fall at home at Christmas and sadly he never made the recovery we had all hoped for.

The size of the congregation at the church and at the Village Hall afterwards - David's second home - reflected the loss being marked, the respect he had earned and the gratitude and admiration of those who knew him.

To most he was the Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, a position he had held for decades. He put so much into making the Hall the success it is today and for that we all owe him a debt of gratitude. It takes commitment and energy to keep it going but to keep improving it year on year needs even more, and David and Audrey had bags of what it takes. They organised events for us, raised money for its upkeep through special events and ensured the plans of the committee came to fruition. Thank you David on behalf of us all.

Beyond the Hall many of us knew David as a cheerful character, always finding time to have a chat with you and always willing to help if you needed anything. He would fix things and carry out occasional repairs for the Parish Council - repair a sign or a bench - without ever asking for recompense and he also might have helped you get your internet connection going or fixed something that was broken.



At St Mary's I learnt he was a Yorkshireman, he had three sons and a daughter, he was Chairman of the Wetherby Motor Club for the last 30 years and he was also an aviation enthusiast. The service included a rendition of the tune from 'Dambusters' and his family engaged us with amusing revelations that sometimes he did not get jobs done at home with the same enthusiasm he showed for the Hall. And that sometimes, he had a relaxed approach to health & safety not in keeping with 21st century! I have done a couple of jobs with David and the latter came as no surprise to me. I wish I had known him better. David will be sorely missed by his family, his friends and by Barley village to whom he gave so much over the last 50 years. Derek Heap

Barley Parish Council

The two big issues at the last PC meeting involved planning matters and parking. An application for outline planning permission to build five houses at Barley House, (the imposing building situated across the stream, in effect to the rear of the turning circle) on the site of the farmyard and agricultural buildings, has been submitted to Pendle BC (13/15/0030P) and is currently open to public response. The proposal is just to split the site into 5 self build plots with access and services to each. There are no details on the type of building, quality or style at this point, but if approved, each plot owner will be responsible for obtaining full planning permission for their dwelling.

This development is within the village settlement boundary and as such Pendle BC's planning policies are receptive to development. Following on from the eleven new homes in Barley Green, the PC has commented upon the over-development of the village and the change in character that can follow. Our full response can be found on the planning web-site. As you would expect traffic congestion and parking are mentioned and this leads on to the parking issues covered extensively in previous newsletters.

The majority of residents and the Council want the turning circle restored to its function as a turning circle and as a centre-piece.

Our first steps to achieve this will be with a signage campaign in early March to discourage parking on the circle and hopefully that will resolve the matter. We will initially allow parking after 6pm on the circle to take the pressure off residents in the vicinity competing for parking spaces outside their homes in the early evening. Residents from Pendle Row and from Pendle View/Beckside have applied, separately, for resident parking status and, if successful, this would restore some normality for them but it will bring road lining in to the village.

The decision on the Barley House planning application will be taken at a future public meeting of the Barrowford & Western Parishes committee at Holmefield House, Barrowford.

On a separate matter, and on behalf of some residents we approached LCC about the possibility of a 20mph zone through the village, but this was not supported. Derek Heap
