
Dear Friends

Half-term in the Brecon Beacons and an opportunity to read a whole novel in a few days. Richard Beard's Acts of the Assassins – a detective story. The plot is complex because the action conflates now with a world 2000 years old. The investigation is what happened to the body of Jesus?



Beard doesn't come over as a Christian and yet in his account the

investigation is never resolved. Did the disciples steal the body? Did Jesus survive the crucifixion? Did the disciples manage to switch Jesus for a lesser disciple on the way to Calvary? The investigators have to change hypotheses as evidence fails to materialise. What is unchanging though is the disciples' faith that Jesus is risen and will return, and their unflinching zeal in the face of persecution.

At the end of the novel, the lead sleuth retires in the company of John the Apostle to Patmos still puzzled but not believing. 'It is true that occasionally Cassius Gallio is comforted by what John is able to believe, a vision of eternity where everything is now, and now is everything. At the same time he's proud never to have called on Jesus for help.' The novel leaves everything in the air. And yet I was left with the voice of Sherlock Holmes ringing in my ear. When every other explanation has been discounted, the explanation that is left, no matter how unbelievable, is what happened. No theft of a body; no last minute switch; no survival of a brutal execution. Just resurrection.

At the end of this month Christians everywhere will be celebrating the most challenging event of human history: how a human being came through death to new life. As St Paul said, The message is offensive to some, and nonsense to others, but to those whom God has called, it is wisdom and power.
