Dear Friends



I'm writing this with the news of the bombings in Brussels whirling around the media. As well as the human tragedy, experts are giving their views on security, radicalisation and the vulnerability of every

major city. It is occupying my mind alongside the business of this week, so-called 'Holy Week'. By the time you read this we may have moved on. But the underlying question won't have gone away. It will have just slipped down our priorities.

The question is to do with what it means to be human. Certainly some modern views treat us as determined by the chemistry of our bodies, or in a wider sense by the agenda of survival. They perhaps explain us at one level, but not at the level of personality. What is it about human nature that we possess an 'innate' sense of right and wrong, and an aspiration to goodness, but so often we do not achieve what we hope for? St Paul put it like this: Even though the desire to do good is in me, I am not able to do it.

That is only part of it. As humans we are able to take the best in our nature and pervert it. So faith becomes a pretext for murder; and the need to be loved an opportunity for abuse and trafficking.

Is there an antidote? As a society we are encouraged to celebrate the positive values of respect and tolerance. We need also to protect vulnerable people from the messages of hate and abuse around them especially on the internet. Such measures operate on the macro scale. Government can devise strategies, but society is made up of individuals. This is why we also need to respond at a personal level. To what extent are our own attitudes, words and actions driven by goodness, kindness, compassion? There is a health warning. It might come at a cost to ourselves.

We have just celebrated Jesus' death and resurrection. As a narrative it is about someone who was prepared to give up everything out of love and compassion. But it is also an affirmation that goodness is stronger than evil, love is stronger than hatred, and life is stronger than death.

Barley Parish Council

The clocks have just leapt forward and we are in to British Summer Time, or daylight saving time as the idea was called when it was first introduced in 1916 just 100 years ago. The idea by William Willet was to make the maximum use of daylight hours and so reduce domestic coal consumption allowing more to be diverted to the war effort as the First World War raged on. The Summer Time Act of 1916 was guickly passed by Parliament and the first day of British Summer Time, 21 May 1916, was widely reported in the press. It continues to be reported widely today but still people get caught out and turn up an hour early, this year I saw some resident early birds at the bus stop in Barley bemoaning the 12 o clock bus had not arrived oblivious to the time being only 11:15... .it was a pleasure to enlighten them and point to the village clock in front of them.

On the subject of light we have had two modern LED street lights introduced in to the village at Barley Green. I am not sure why because they are out of keeping with the rest of the sodium lights throughout the village, they are not on the main thoroughfare so they do not stand out but they would look most odd if they were.

As reported last month, the seven properties that make up the old water treatment works are getting closer to completion and are up for sale. They are to a good specification and guide prices are £295k for 3 bedrooms and £350k for 4 bedrooms. The developer was successful with a planning application to convert the old store room at the Ogden end of the development to a 2 storey holiday let which will be sold with the end property. The Council strongly objected to this development, as did residents of Barley Green, on the grounds of urbanisation, loss of views and more parking issues but it all fell on deaf ears.

The Parish Council is becoming increasingly frustrated by the inconsistent decisions and ambiguous support for the AONB villages from the Borough Council.

Parking issues dominated the last PC meeting and representatives from the Cabin and the Pendle Inn attended. We have been looking at various surfacing options for the car park over the last 12 months whilst progressing grant support applications which all proved unsuccessful. The Council have now decided to retain a rustic stone surface and accept that pothole repairs will be required once or twice a year. Parking in the turning circle has become a problem again and so we have had to bring the no parking sign and cones forward to become more prominent and ask local businesses to support the PC and not use it as an overflow or staff car park.

Finally, we have received a response to the query the PC sent to our MP regarding the cancellation of the mobile phone reception project. Essentially the project failed because of "protracted negotiations with the land owner" but I suspect there is more to it, with the press reporting issues between the government and Arqiva. There is a hint the project might still have some life but the PC is sceptical. Derek Heap

Life and death are serious subjects but there were many amusing moments when members of Barley WI refreshed their CPR skills. The arrival of Defibrillators in our three Pendleside villages prompted the WI to invite Trainers from Rossendale and Pendle Mountain Rescue Team to give training in the use of these devices. Elizabeth Hobday, who works as an Emergency Nurse Practitioner and Elizabeth Toft, a student Paramedic, explained that if somebody collapses from a heart attack, you should first dial 999, then start CPR to get the heart going and air into the lungs. Once the heart is beating, it often goes into a dangerously inefficient, irregular rhythm and this is where the Defibrillator comes in, to restore a normal healthy rhythm. The machine checks the rhythm before

delivering an electric shock, which will not be given if it is not needed. WI members were reassured to know that they could not do harm with the machine and that it "talked" them though all the stages of its use. As one member pointed out, with many walkers, often elderly, taking on the challenge of Pendle, it was good to know how to do CPR and use the Defibrillator.



The WI have been "digging for Britain" again, although, truth to tell, there was a man doing a lot of the hard work!

Barley WI were allocated thirty trees by the Woodland Trust to plant at the side of the Picnic Area in Barley. The man was Frank Wilkinson, Barley Parish Council's official Lengthsman. Frank dug the holes while volunteers from the WI Committee planted the small trees, covering each one with a plastic protector to keep the rabbits out then using canes to hold them in place. The trees are Silver Birch, Rowan and Wild Cherry. It is hoped that they will provide Spring colour and Autumn berries, as well as helping to stabilise the bank. Later, the WI plan to plant Willow at the base of the bank, in a very wet area which should suit Willow.
