Dear Friends



What was your reaction at the revelation of leaks from Mossack Fonseca about the dealings of off-shore investments? Indignation, anger, envy, disbelief? Any or all would be fairly common responses. And for those caught in the public eye, it was a bit embarrassing, especially for those who couldn't quite come up with a straight answer. Of course not all the investments are instances of tax evasion. Some are no doubt legitimate, but it is also important to acknowledge that tax evasion is not a victimless crime. It's taking money out of your pocket and mine and contributing to so-called austerity in our society.

My initial reaction was pity. What is it about the possession of large sums of money that makes some people so desperate to hang on to it, and keep it to themselves? Material wealth is a blessing from God for us to enjoy and to use for his glory. In times past, and for people like Bill Gates and Mark Zuckerberg, wealth is something you should use to enrich other people's lives. And yet for other people it can become an

oppressive burden. One explanation I heard for salting money away in offshore banks is because people are frightened.

Jesus told a story about a man who trusted in his wealth. Obviously his investments were doing well, so he decided to invest in bigger holdings. What he overlooked was his own mortality. The moral of the story was that we need to see ourselves in the bigger picture. Are we placing our investments in the right stock? Jesus had a nice phrase for it – treasure in heaven.

Tax, Care and Toy Boys with Michael Southwarth

There was a full house in Barley when the WI invited Michael Hindley, a previous MEP for the area to speak on "Understanding the EU".

He said that the original idea had come during WWII. In 1943, Jean Monnet became a member of the French Committee of National Liberation, the de facto French government in exile in Algiers. It was at this time that he first became explicit about his vision for a union of Europe to regain and retain peace. During a meeting of this committee on 5 August 1943, Monnet declared: "There will be no peace in Europe, if the states are reconstituted on the basis of national sovereignty... The countries of Europe are too small to guarantee their peoples the necessary prosperity and social development."

He wanted to avoid a repeat of the economic and political collapse which in Germany had allowed the rise of Fascism and in Russia the rise of Communism.

The first step was on 9 May 1950, when Robert Schuman, France's Minister of Foreign Affairs proposed to place all German-French production of coal and steel under one High Authority. The idea behind this was that if the production of these resources was shared by the two most powerful countries on the continent, it would prevent any future war. As the governments of Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg replied favourably, this declaration laid the basis for the European Coal and Steel Community, the predecessor to the European Economic Community and subsequent European Union.

As the UK chose not to join at that time, by the time Edward Heath decided to join, the "rules of the club" had already been put in place and he had to accept them. Moving to the present time, Michael Hindley outlined those areas over which the EU has no power: Finance, Taxes, Defence, Education, the NHS and Social Services. The EU promotes the free movement of Goods, Capital, Labour and Services. The idea is to redistribute wealth to the areas that lag behind, still aiming to avoid a of the economic and political collapse which fosters discontent and extremism. Although the UK has paid a lot into the EU, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, as well as Lancashire, have received more back to stimulate struggling economies. He expressed his concern that if there was a "No" vote at the referendum, Scotland, Ireland and Wales would push to leave the UK, as they had so much to lose.

After Michael Hindley had answered many questions, WI President thanked him for honestly stating his own position but explaining both sides of the Referendum debate in a clear and courteous manner

In a lighter vein, the evening ended with the judging of the Easter Craft Competition by visiting members of Downham and Fence WIs. The winner was Jeanette Fagan with her Easter willow wreath. Christine Clinch

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday 11th May and you are all invited to attend. This is a particularly important meeting as we want to discuss the issues we face in the village in 2016. Parking will be one of the key issues followed by the transfer of the toilets, the car park and the bus turning circle to the Parish Council. There will be some sensitive issues but this meeting gives us all the opportunity to air our views. Others will be speaking about events in the village and we will finish with wine and nibbles and a chance to catch up with those we do not see often enough — come and join in, those who make the effort always enjoy it

The Council currently has just over £40k in the bank and so another issue we want to discuss is where we should be improving the village. Suggestions include a playground upgrade, improving the toilet facilities, car park surfacing and village green maintenance. We can do some but not all so we will be pleased to hear what residents think.

I picked up a ROSPA flyer last week which reported that in 2014 there were 591 fatalities on urban roads whilst on rural roads there were 982:

suggesting that you are twice as likely to die on rural roads and about three people will each day. Loss of control was the most common cause on rural roads and this is largely due to higher speeds and the more winding nature of the roads. There are much fewer pedestrians in the rural areas but fatalities are not much fewer than urban areas. A surprising statistic is that 72% of car user deaths are in the rural areas - loss of control again the main reason. I tell you all this because you might be one of those who does not realise the risks (there are a few speed maniacs out there) and to support the "Safe Lanes in Pendle" group who are resolute volunteers promoting road safety week in week out but never actually knowing accidents they have prevented how many

- I bet they have made us all slow down at some time or other.

It is with sadness that I report the passing of Bob Hayhurst from Narrowgates. He was well known to many and a pleasure to meet. He was a knowledgeable man who gave his time to local groups giving presentations on local, industrial and naval history amongst other things.
