Dear Friends

This month we commemorate the 100th anniversary of the beginning of the Battle of the Somme. It is especially poignant

here, where the 11th (Service) Battalion of the East Lancashire Regiment, the so-called Accrington Pals, was formed.

The reality of the battle – the massive losses in July and August, attrition as a strategy, an army of civilians having to learn industrial warcraft from their battle-hardened French allies, the eventual victory as the morale of the defenders crumbled - has passed into mythology. It is enshrined in military cemeteries in France, the Thiepval monument, and tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Westminster Abbey. We probably know people who keep alive the memories of grandfathers or great uncles who served or even lost their lives in that battle.

It is worth asking what we remember and why. Perhaps the futility of war destroying so many young lives. Or wonder at why so many young men went willingly into the New Army and knowingly into battle. Even trying to make sense of those events in the wider history of Europe in the 20th century.

We need to honour it for what it is. The Battle of the Somme wasn't the big breakthrough some people hoped for, but it was a major step in bringing Germany to seek an armistice. It gave birth to many of the values that we hold in a modern democracy – a concern for truth and justice, universal suffrage, courage, and respect for the rights of everyone especially the weak. It also showed a quintessential English trait – that ordinary people can step up and work together, show courage and do the right thing.

As we face the challenges of the 21st century I pray in the words of last Sunday's Collect: Increase and multiply upon us thy mercy: that, thou being our ruler and guide we may so pass through things temporal, that we finally lose not the things eternal.

On June 11, as HM The Queen was celebrating her 90th birthday, friends and residents heard the news that Audrey had been named in the Honours List. Audrey has been involved with Barley Village Hall for over 40 years and is currently the booking secretary. She has also been a long-time and highly regarded member of Barley WI and served as the County Chairman of the Lancashire Federation of Women's Institutes for four years; Chairman of the Craft & Produce WI County Show for ten years. She was on the Lancashire Association of Village & Community Halls Committee, as Chairman then Secretary and is involved with the monthly coffee mornings and patchwork & quilting group at the Village Hall. She was delighted but had to remain quiet about the honour for a six week period! She said: "I first found out on April 29th when I received a letter 'On Her Majesty's Service' on the Saturday of the Model Exhibition while working in the kitchen, but I wasn't able to tell anybody about it."
