

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Dear Friends

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What did you make of Boris Johnson's reason for not apologising to the people he had insulted over the years before becoming

Foreign Secretary. In case you missed it, he said, 'It would take too long!'

Not good enough. I hope he listened carefully to John Kerry for a first lesson in diplomacy. Maybe Boris was thinking that most of his invective was as a columnist for The Spectator. On a journal that likes to be outspoken it's ok to say things that offend. It is not unusual in political and debating societies to spice your argument with a couple of insults, and then to have a beer together afterwards. Been there, done that. But not everybody knows these rules and then what's left is resentment.

In the free-for-all of social media it can lead to nastiness being voiced and even acted on, as we saw in the murder of Jo Cox. Yet one of our British values is respect – respect for the law, but also respect for other people in our society. It is especially important to respect people we disagree with. They provide us with a reality check.

Living in a democracy we enjoy a diversity of opinions. We may not agree with them, but they challenge us to defend our beliefs with reasoned argument. The opposite is totalitarianism – everyone goes along with the loudest voice. But when we disagree, we should do so with respect. If we don't, we are opening the way for forces that will harm us.

Two thousand years ago, St Paul understood the destructive forces in the political system he lived in. He said we needed a special kind of armour to defend ourselves – truth, justice, a passion for peace. And most especially, when we speak, we speak God's word. If you want see his full kit list it's in Ephesians 6.10-20.

Heritage Lottery Grant – Update.

The church tower is now watertight - complete with a new roof and stone banding. The drain from the tower foundations is due to be installed soon. This will take the water from the tower and the church roof away from the foundations of the tower.

We are ready to reinstall the organ but we are waiting for some specialist dry rot resistant material to be manufactured to fit behind the organ and prevent a reoccurrence of the problem. Once the material is delivered to Sixsmiths the Organ Builders the organ will be rebuilt.

The Heritage Lottery fund have said that our supporting activities are excellent and have released the next part of the grant.

GOLDSHAW BOOTH PC

Residents in Newchurch have requested a 20 mph speed limit through the village, which was supported by councillors at a recent Parish Council, but also adding Spenbrook to the speed limit area. As it is expected that building at Spenbrook Mill will commence soon, thus increasing the volume of traffic, it was felt appropriate to petition for the speed limit adjustment for both hamlets at the same time. Parish Councillors Carl Ryder and Andy Cowell have circulated residents with petitions and these

are being forwarded to County Councillor Christian Wakeford, who will pursue this cause with Lancashire County Council. Carl and Andy have spent a great deal of time organising this project, which I am sure residents will appreciate, and recognise the important role parish councillors fulfil in representing residents concerns.

The vegetation around our verges and footpaths has grown to its full height and now needs cutting. The public footpath between Spenbrook and Newchurch has just been cleared of vegetation as well as the much used public right of way to the left of the toilet block in Newchurch. There is a continuing problem with Lancashire County Council not cutting the roadside verges, which residents have commented on. It is not a satisfactory situation and the Parish Council will continue to press LCC to fulfil its obligation.

There is still a vacancy for a Parish Councillor and despite expressions of interest, no-one has come forward at a council meeting. If you wish to represent your area and help to get things done, please come along the next meeting of Goldshaw Booth Parish Council on Tuesday, 9th August at 7pm.

ROUGHLEE

The past few months have seen significant changes at Roughlee Parish Council. The long serving Chairman and Responsible Financial Officer (RFO), Martin Schofield has retired to direct his energies elsewhere. His contributions to the Parish Council, and to the village have been immense and we all owe him a debt of aratitude. As we do to Elaine Todd who was mentioned last month Also our long serving Clerk, Carol Donohoe, has retired after more than seven years service. Our thanks and best wishes go to Carol. We now have a new Clerk. Mary Reed joined a couple of months ago and has recently also taken the role of RFO. Both posts carry real and significant responsibilities but, in the short time that I have been with the Council, I have seen just how able and competent she is. The administration and finances of the Council are in good hands.

Following an appeal for new members in Parish News a couple of months ago two new Councillors have been co-opted, Nigel Brotherton and myself. Due to recent changes to personnel, the Council, at its AGM in May, was unable to appoint a new Chairman.

The current Councillors all have their separate responsibilities and did not feel able to take on the job of Chairman.

It was against this background that I joined the Council offering my experience in local government and planning as something that may be useful. I also made clear that my DIY skills were not something I was proud of! One meeting in I found myself appointed Chairman and I will do my best to live up to this responsible task. Thanks are due to Colin Williams, our vice-chairman, who has provided cover in the meantime.

A bit of personal information may be appropriate. I worked in Government for some 30 years and in Town Planning for over 50 years, (is this possible for one so young and handsome!). In fact I still work as a planning consultant for several hours per week but I shall ensure that no conflict occurs with my role on the Parish Council. Elizabeth and I live in Crowtrees Grove and have been there since new in 1973. We have seen our neighbours come and go but, throughout, it has been a friendly and helpful place to live. Daughter Lucy went to Roughlee School in the era of Mrs Watkinson and has fond memories of her time there. Given the threats to its existence from time to time it is wonderful to see the thriving establishment we have today.

In spite of our time in the village we are probably not well known outside of our immediate neighbourhood. Elizabeth keeps strange and (very) early hours looking after her horses and is generally a very private person. I travel a lot playing golf, albeit to a miserable and declining standard, and this is my main social interest. Nevertheless, I will make every effort to meet as many of the villagers as possible so if you recognise me, please say hello and introduce yourselves.

Being very new to the post I have little to say at this stage on how things will develop. I am aware that following the recent difficulties, some things have not gone according to plan. An important minus point was our failure to hold an Annual Parish Meeting. This is something which is required by law and is the opportunity for all villagers to take part in and comment /

complain about issues affecting Roughlee. No doubt many of the issues, for example highway matters, fall outside of the Parish Council's remit but we do have Councillors from both the County and Borough Councils at our meetings so we can influence matters. Towards the next Annual Meeting, probably in June next year, I hope to develop a dialogue with villagers so that we can have a well-attended, even rowdy, exchange. It may seem a long way off but please let us know how we can help of what ideas you have to improve the village.

One great success we can be proud of is the Village Centre which hosts a wide range of events including the luncheon club, Christmas lunch and many other social and family events. James Starkie chairs the Village Centre Committee and is ably supported by willing volunteers who run the various events; a good example of which was the Duck Race / BBQ on 16th July. New volunteers are always welcome and needed so if you can help please give James a call.

By the time of the next Parish News I hope I will have more to say about what the Parish Council is about and what we are doing to look after our village, but please remember your input is vital if we are to serve Roughlee and make sure it remains a wonderful place to live.
