Dear Friends

Seasonal Affective Disorder seems to have come early this year – that strange phenomenon whereby reduced light affects your mood. Or could it be that the news is particularly depressing at



the moment – no relief for the people in Aleppo; a presidential election campaign that is really scraping the barrel; the possible uncertainty being created about our economic and political future?

The beauty of autumn colours in the sunshine does lift the spirits but even that is a reminder of winter ahead. Curiously I want to talk about hope. I find myself asking, Where is the hope? The more I reflect on what's happening in the world, the less I see it in human institutions and politics. They seem to be inhabited by forces that more often than not work against the greater good. St Paul described them as spiritual forces which look to dominate and overpower. We may not share his worldview, but the effects are the same.

St Paul's message is to put on 'God's armour' – truth, justice, and faith. And, he says, Be ready to bring Good News. The Good News is that of Jesus who didn't use his position to overpower, but to serve and to be a victim. The scandal of the Christian message is this actually makes a difference. Victory over evil is inevitable. Wherever people are putting others first, risking their security to care for others, being motivated by compassion, then hope is at work and making a difference. And hope for us is to join in.

As briefly mentioned last month, we won the Lancashire Best Kept Village (Hamlet Class) for 2016, beating all fifteen entrants in the competition. The village has looked clean, tidy and looked-after all summer and this was clearly appreciated by the judges and I am glad that the efforts of many villagers have been recognised. The summer has been average but we have hosted over 25,000 visitors and still kept our highways and byways pretty much trash free, that is only achieved by us all doing our bit!

The competition is designed to encourage community effort and involvement in keeping villages and their facilities tidy and well maintained and I believe the competition does provide a focus, but in the end we all benefit from looking after our own patch.

On behalf of the Parish Council - who entered the village into the competition - I would like to thank the villagers and businesses who contributed in some way and on a personal note to thank John Connor who was the lead Councillor on this project and Frank Wilkinson who kept on top of our landscape areas as our lengthsman.

Talking of John Connor, our three villages owe him a debt of gratitude as he has just taken on the role of regularly checking our three defibrillators.

I would like to introduce Ian Milne as our new co-opted Councillor. We have been advertising for a Councillor on the noticeboard for over two months and I am delighted we eventually got a volunteer. Ian lives at Barley Green in the new detached hose by the Village Hall and he brings new energy, ideas and a professional approach to council business.

If you have not tried them yet, there is a new slide and swing on the playground which you must have a go on. The new equipment was proposed by Cllr Statham and she has been the project lead gathering ideas, specifications and prices before submitting them to the Council who approved the project. She can be found swinging and sliding whilst the grandchildren patiently wait their turn. Finally, the Council will be placing some planters on the footway at the corner of Barley Lane, opposite the 'post office' and where the junction forks off up to Black Moss reservoirs. They should prevent footway parking which forces people out on to the road on a blind bend which is dangerous. We hope these will be a success and not too intrusive

ROUGHLEE

I was away on holiday for the last two weeks of October so this news item is not as topical as I would like but the last Parish Council meeting on 3rd October had a full agenda so there are a few items to report.

Perhaps the key one was to receive the very sad news that the Bay Horse Inn had been damaged by a kitchen fire and will now be closed until some time in 2017. This means that our village pub will not be available over the Christmas / New Year period and many bookings have been cancelled. The Parish Council is hoping to find out further details and also agreed to look into what steps could be taken to preserve this valued community asset.

Arrangements for the Senior Citizens' Christmas lunch are progressing well and two more volunteers have come forward to help on the day. Thanks to all concerned.

On planning matters it was reported that a livestock building above Thorneyholme Farm had been approved. The proposal to convert the barn at Thorneyholme Farm was also discussed and five members of the public, representing both the applicants and neighbours, made representations to the Council. Whilst accepting the principle of a conversion the Council expressed concerns relating to the materials proposed for the garage block. The Council's comments have been sent to the planning officer.

The dangerous state of the riverside path at Thorneyholme was again discussed. Representations to both the County and Borough Councils have, so far, produced little in the way of a positive response. This is an important issue for both the land owner and the very many people who use this footpath on a regular basis and we will continue to seek a proper repair.

The next Parish Council meeting is on 7th November at 7.30pm. Villagers are very welcome to attend the meetings, whether to raise an issue or simply to meet the Councillors and listen to the discussions. We have heard from residents who have recently arrived in the village and if you wish to come and say hello that would be great!
